He attended the University at Lausanne, the medical school at Zurich, and the universities at Heidelberg and Munich. His father, a clergyman, annoyed by Louis's ambition to become a naturalist, urged him to study medicine instead so that he might earn a comfortable living. Louis obediently enrolled in medical school, but at night he continued his study of living and fossil fishes.

Fortune helped Agassiz to enter his chosen field. On the recommendation of one of his instructors, he was asked by C.P. Von Martius, who had returned from Brazil with a cargo of rare Amazon fishes, to collaborate with him in studying and classifying the specimens for future publication. When Louis was twenty-one years old, his book was published and was greeted with acclaim. Agassiz was recognized as a young prodigy. The success of this book had several important consequences. It persuaded his father to accept the fact that he was determined to be a naturalist. It also brought Louis to the attention of great French scientist, Cuvier. The old scientist invited Louis of his home in Paris, encouraged him to write a book and handed over to him his notes, specimens and fossils.
